KIRKWOOD STUDENT ENJOYS EXPLORING A VARIETY OF OPPORTUNITIES

Grace Miller has some advice for high school graduates unsure of their next step: Enroll at Kirkwood because Kirkwood gives you a chance to explore all your options before you choose your path.

A 2021 Cedar Rapids Prairie High School graduate, Miller is a Liberal Arts major at Kirkwood, a cheerleader, in two jazz choirs — thanks to a Kirkwood music scholarship — and is discovering a plethora of possibilities at Kirkwood.

Before she started at Kirkwood, Miller considered going right to a 4-year college. But it was Kirkwood's affordability, proximity to home, and easy transfer process after earning her A.A. degree that helped her choose.

"It makes sense to go to Kirkwood. You can get your general education

classes, and it's a good transition from high school to becoming an adult, independent," she explained.

Miller's first year went well.

"I like the small classes and how easy it is to get to know my professors," she added. "They're very willing to help. I feel supported. And there are lots of free events, the recreation center, and lots of things to do on campus."

Miller enjoys stretching her boundaries.

"Every class has given me a skill," she said. "I've learned a lot more about other things, like taking Introduction to Play Analysis. It's interesting, even though I'm not a Theatre major."

Miller has already decided she's not going to rush her Kirkwood experience.

"I want time to have good grades but also have time for other things," Miller explained. "This is that one time in your life to have the opportunity to do that. Four classes a semester is enough for me. We should be looking toward the future but enjoying the moment too."

Miller enjoys cheerleading at basketball games and competitions. She liked being a Student Ambassador for one semester, helping students and their families consider Kirkwood.

Miller's choir involvement has been especially rewarding, she said. She is in Jazz Express and Jazz Transit choirs. Her Kirkwood scholarship covers her music courses and voice lessons with a music professor.

"I really like it and want to keep doing it but not necessarily for a major," Miller said. "It's another path to explore."

Her strongest advice for students undecided on their future?

"Don't be intimidated by not knowing your major or what you want to do," Miller stressed. "It's OK to not know! Give yourself time. It's important to give yourself opportunities. You'll figure it out, eventually. And you'll learn your values along the way."

BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE

KIRKWOOD CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT GRADUATE LED STUDENT CENTER RENOVATION PROJECT



This summer, Tyler Cooksley looked at the astonishing, renovated Kirkwood Student Center — now an open, clean space with huge windows and a view of the sky looking north — and shook his head.

He was standing where he'd been a Kirkwood student in Construction Management 10 years ago and was viewing the completion of a two-year-plus major renovation he led as project superintendent for Larson Construction.

"For me, with this phenomenal project, I've truly come full circle," he said.

Growing up in Independence, Iowa, Cooksley was shaped by those around him: his grandpa in his basement woodshop and his uncle in his residential construction work.

"I learn by watching — a lot," Cooksley explained.

After high school, Cooksley worked in residential construction with his uncle, made a good living, and, in

the process, discovered he loved it. From there, he didn't know if he wanted to study design, architecture, or engineering in college, or explore on-site management.

"I wasn't sure what I wanted to do, but Kirkwood is a great place to figure that out," he said.

During orientation, Cooksley found that Kirkwood's Construction Management program gave him everything he was seeking.

"It had all aspects — design, engineering, and construction management — to put it all together," he said. "Out in the field, managing on-site, I knew that was my calling."

The program required an internship with hands-on work.

"It was an awesome experience," Cooksley said. "Kirkwood professors really try to help you figure out if this is what you want to do. I worked with Steve Gee Construction in Independence."

During his second year at Kirkwood, Cooksley focused more on commercial construction and leadership.

"Kirkwood's faculty — all of them — were phenomenal," Cooksley said. "They all had their own businesses, so they offered real-life experience and knowledge. You get that one-on-one with them. They're here to challenge you, to see what your skill sets are."

Graduating with his A.A. in 2012, Cooksley planned to work summers and transfer to the University of Northern Iowa for a 4-year degree. He had the knowledge to begin testing

his skills. He worked with Steve Gee Construction again that spring. By summer, he needed more work; Larson hired him and he never looked back.

The first three years Cooksley was learning from other superintendents on commercial projects. Since 2015, he's been a superintendent on building sites all over the state. He led several big school projects, including a new sports complex in North Liberty in 2018 and assisting in a three-year, \$120-million project to build a high school in Waukee in 2019.

"I absolutely loved it," he said. "I had expected to get a bachelor's degree, but Larson gave me the experience I needed to excel in the industry."

Cooksley loves that the Student Center has created a more open, welcoming gathering space for students, which is what Kirkwood is all about, he noted.

Next up for Cooksley is a Larson project building an FBO hangar for private charters at the Eastern Iowa Airport. He said he's still learning and enjoys the terrific support and great co-workers at Larson. "It's a family-owned business that respects and cares about its employees," Cooksley said.

Cooksley's success started with choosing Kirkwood.

"No matter what you want to do, Kirkwood offers you the chance to pursue your dreams, explore yourself, learn what you want to do, and see what's out there."

Kirkwood partners with local hospitals to set students up for success

Kirkwood has partnered with UnityPoint Health – St. Luke’s Hospital, Mercy Medical Center, and Mercy Iowa City to help students who are about to enter one of the most in-demand career fields. The (St. Luke’s) Senior Student Promise Program, Mercy Earn + Learn, and Mercy Iowa City JumpStart programs provide benefits for nursing students, including financial assistance and employment after graduation. Each program and its benefits are unique, giving students the opportunity to select the program that best suits their needs.

Collaboration leads to new symphony orchestra offering

In addition to partnering with local hospitals, Kirkwood is partnering with the Cedar Rapids Community Orchestra (CRCO) to offer symphony orchestra to music students. Students will now receive college credit for being in orchestra and have the option to perform alongside experienced CRCO members. The collaboration also provides new recruitment opportunities for the college and marks the first time in its history that orchestra will be offered.

The Hotel at Kirkwood Center recognized for hospitality and facility excellence

The Hotel at Kirkwood Center was named the 2022 Best Banquet/Event Facility by the Corridor Business Journal (CBJ) as part of the publication’s annual Best of the Corridor survey. Selected by CBJ readers, this marks the sixth time The Hotel has achieved this recognition. In addition, the facility recently received the AAA Four Diamond Award, making it the only AAA Four Diamond-rated hotel in Cedar Rapids and one of only four hotels in the state with this distinction. This is the 11th consecutive year the organization has received the AAA Four Diamond Award.

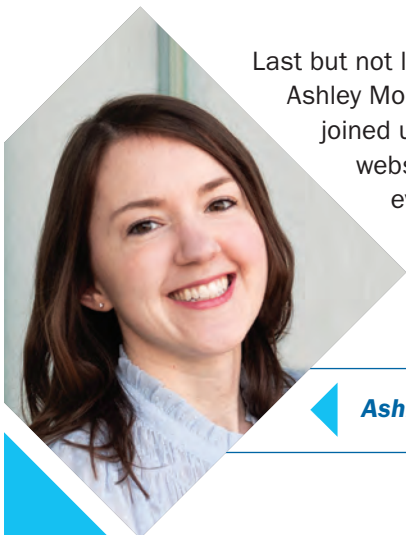

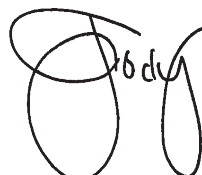
