HARD WORK + KIRKWOOD SCHOLARSHIPS

SUPPORT AG BUSINESS STUDENT'S SUCCESS

It's hard to believe Dylan Kortenkamp is just 19 years old.

Already, he hauls grain and livestock with his own semitruck and trailers to help him buy into his family's farm in northeast lowa. Dylan is clear eyed and diligent in his plans and how to achieve them. He knows a good education is key; he found that in Kirkwood's Agriculture Business program.

"I knew Kirkwood had one of the best ag schools in the country," Dylan says.

Two scholarships from the Kirkwood Foundation have covered most of his tuition costs: a GROWMARK Foundation scholarship for the 2019 – '20 academic year and a Cargill scholarship this coming academic year. Dylan will graduate with his A.A.S. in May 2022, begin working full time on the farm, and expand his trucking business.

Farming is in his blood. Originally from Winthrop, Iowa, Dylan lives outside of Aurora, just down the road from his parents' farm, on an acreage they own. His parents have livestock and 200 acres. "I've always known I wanted to be on the farm," Dylan says. "I knew I'd have to do something else besides farm because it wouldn't support two families."

As a high school senior, Dylan bought the semi and two trailers to haul livestock and grain for the family farm. He now hauls for others as well. Even with a full load of classes in spring 2021, Dylan worked on the farm and hauled grain and livestock.

Dylan was accepted at Kirkwood as a high school junior, but since he had a full, two-year scholarship in Agribusiness at Des Moines Area Community College, he started there; it was also a chance to be away from home, on his own.

"But it wasn't the right environment for me," Dylan says. "I knew Kirkwood is where I wanted to come. I also wanted to be part of the family farm. It wasn't OK with me to be gone from the farm for two years."

At Kirkwood, he could help at home and earn his degree.

"I came to learn the business side of farming," he explains.

"Eventually, I'll be farming full time. I'll grow my trucking company to help with the farm and add that income."

Kirkwood has been the right fit. Small classes allow him to get to know classmates and teachers and make it more comfortable when asking questions.

"I love all my teachers. They're super helpful," he explains. "If you have questions after hours, you can meet one-on-one with them. You learn more that way and have that knowledge for your future."

Good role models have clearly influenced him. At age 20, his dad had built his first hog building. Like his dad, Dylan is on the right path.

"He was always way ahead," Dylan says. "He knew what he wanted and what he had to do to get there."

SPUR INTERNATIONAL STUDENT TOWARD DREAM

Serge Konga knew the meaning of "commitment" long before he mastered English. It fits the solid focus this Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) native has had since his arrival in the U.S. in 2015. Kirkwood Community College is key to his ongoing success since.

Serge left the DRC for Iowa City, where his mother had lived years before, to pursue his childhood dream of building his own business. He knew he needed a good education in business to someday establish and grow his own multinational business. He immersed himself in learning English, started his studies at Kirkwood, and worked three parttime jobs so he could support himself as well as his wife and young son, who also live here, and his mother and some of his siblings in the DRC.

When he first arrived in the U.S., Serge says his English was "a catastrophe." In January 2016, he started taking free English classes at Kirkwood's Learning Center on the Iowa City campus and his English proficiency greatly improved. In May 2016, he switched to for-credit English Language Acquisition (ELA) classes at Kirkwood.

"That's the way to go for those from non-English-speaking countries," he says. "Start with English classes, then begin your major studies." He then worked part time at the Learning Center helping new students and immigrants from around the world learn about Kirkwood, register for English classes, and start courses to gain their General Equivalency Degree (GED) or Pathways to Success. He also helped translate for French speakers (DRC is a Frenchspeaking country) and was an office assistant.

By 2018, he was ready to begin studying Business Administration at Kirkwood.

"Kirkwood was the best option because it was affordable," Serge says. He also felt comfortable because the campus is small enough that he could study in the library and student areas, and it was easy to get from one class to the next.

"Also, Kirkwood is a welcoming place, no matter what your background is," Serge adds. "I felt safe and comfortable at Kirkwood, accepted for who I am."

Best of all, Serge emphasizes, were the scholarships and college support from the Kirkwood Foundation that helped cover tuition and other expenses: Project START (Supported Training and Retraining) for academic and financial assistance; a study abroad scholarship; the Louis Hill Jr. Memorial Endowed Scholarship for Accounting

students with a minimum 3.0 GPA and demonstrated leadership qualities; a free laptop through the Laptop Assistance Program; and Work-Study.

Through his study abroad experience, Serge worked with student teams in Australia on special projects, observing events and then offering recommendations on improving operations and logistics, training, and marketing — all valuable learning experiences for a future business owner.

The scholarships were vital, Serge says, or he could not have eased back on all of his part-time jobs and focused on his studies. Instead, he worked one part-time job and managed to support his family without student loans. He also was on the Dean's List every semester.

Serge graduated from Kirkwood in May 2021 and began his full-time studies in Business Administration at the University of Iowa, majoring in Finance with a minor in International Relations. This fall he will be a junior and hopes to graduate in 2023 or 2024.

He credits Kirkwood with giving him the support that kept him moving forward.

"Kirkwood has helped me a lot over the years," he says. "It made a big difference."

CREATING A LEGACY NOW AND FOREVER

Darwin Boelts and Dakota Parks Schorg were special people whose families and friends honored them in a unique way: an endowed scholarship with Kirkwood Community College.

An endowment is a wonderful way to honor someone who is living or deceased. Endowed funds can be created through outright gifts of cash or appreciated assets, gifts of life insurance or retirement plan assets, a bequest in a will, or through a life income gift such as a charitable gift annuity or a charitable remainder trust. Once the endowment is established, a fixed percentage of its annual value is designated to the scholarship or program each year, reinvesting additional earnings and building up the fund over time. Because use of the fund is restricted to a small portion each year, the fund can last in perpetuity. Donors who endow a scholarship are invited to join the Samuel J. Kirkwood Society, which hosts a special evening at The Hotel at Kirkwood Center each fall. For more information about endowments, please contact us at 319-398-5442.





FIREFIGHTER'S SCHOLARSHIP PERPETUATES LEGACY, HELPS OTHERS

Darwin Boelts never doubted his decision to become a firefighter. It was his passion, which led him to encourage others to consider it. His own inspiration made it easy.

That enthusiasm never flagged in his 30 years with the Waterloo Fire Department. Sadly, shortly after retiring at age 55, Darwin was diagnosed with brain cancer. He died on July 12, 2019.

But his legacy lives on, thanks to the Darwin D. Boelts Memorial Scholarship established by his wife, Maribeth, with the Kirkwood Foundation. It's the perfect honor for a man who loved helping others; it funds and supports students in Kirkwood's Fire Science program.

Maribeth credits her sister Judith Wightman (also married to a firefighter) with suggesting the scholarship in Darwin's name to help others become firefighters.

"I thought that was a great idea," Maribeth says. "It seems very fitting for him. He really believed in the work. He was proud of his job and enjoyed learning the science of fire."

When Maribeth and Darwin were dating, he decided to pursue firefighting. He completed his training through Hawkeye Community College and the Iowa Firefighting Academy and was also certified as a paramedic.

Throughout his career, Darwin rarely discussed fire scenes, Maribeth recalls. After one horrible fire that killed a mother and two children, he never spoke of it. But he was deeply sad and quiet, she says.

"He was really humble," Maribeth remembers. "He was quiet but he had a lot of courage."

Many cancers are now associated with firefighting because of the chemicals firefighters are exposed to — from structure fires that release toxic chemicals and some of the materials used to suppress fires. Darwin knew that, Maribeth says, and yet he had no regrets.

"There are a lot of risks," she

explains. "But he said he would do it all over again. He was a positive, forward-thinking person."

After his diagnosis, Darwin researched the cancers now linked to firefighting. Some states now provide firefighters with healthcare coverage after retirement. Darwin helped pursue that for lowa firefighters. A legislative bill providing five years' coverage for retired firefighters passed the House this year and should reach the Senate this fall.

Family members helped fund Darwin's scholarship when it was established in 2019; last year it was fully funded, so it has already begun to provide financial support to Kirkwood Fire Science students.

Maribeth misses Darwin fiercely, she says, and stays in touch with his fellow firefighters. The scholarship keeps his spirit alive.

"I got my first 'thank you' from a student this spring," Maribeth says with a smile. "That is really meaningful to me. I will save every one of those I get."

DAKOTA PARKS SCHORG OX YOKE INN® MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

Dakota Schorg started work at the Ox Yoke Inn® as a dishwasher when he was 17. From there, he progressed through each workstation in the Amana restaurant until, after just five years, he held the top job: lead cook.

Bill Leichsenring, president and CEO of the Ox Yoke Inn[®], could see that Dakota was a natural for a culinary career.

"He really worked his way through and was very focused. That was his goal, and he made it," Bill recalls. "I asked him, if he was interested, if he would enroll in Kirkwood's culinary program and continue working for us. He was."

Sadly, Dakota died in a car accident on his way to work Jan. 15, 2020. But those who loved him have kept his spirit alive through a remarkable memorial scholarship in his name at Kirkwood. Dakota was unable to attend Kirkwood's Culinary Arts program, but he can now give that chance to deserving graduates at Benton Community Schools where Dakota graduated from in 2017.

The fundraising effort to endow the scholarship is especially heartwarming. Leichsenring, his family, and Ox Yoke Inn® customers funded it through sales of an Ox Yoke Inn® special, the "Dakota Delight" sandwich based on Dakota's favorite food: a pretzel-crusted chicken breast with Alfredo sauce and Parmesan cheese. More than 1,600 sandwiches were sold.

Dakota's parents, Dan and Marsha, and his sister Montana invited 40 friends and family members to a Celebration of Life at the Ox Yoke Inn[®] on what would have been Dakota's 23rd birthday. There, Leichsenring surprised them by presenting an enlarged check for \$5,562 — the balance to fully fund the Dakota Parks Schorg Ox Yoke Inn[®] Memorial Scholarship. The first scholarship will be awarded in 2022.



"I just thought what an appropriate time to make that announcement and present the check," Leichsenring notes. "We were honored to present it."

Dakota's mom describes the surprise as a priceless moment.

"I'm speechless with it," she says. "It's incredible, all that support. It definitely puts a smile on our faces in hard times. And it keeps him alive, in a sense."

The Dakota Delight remains on the Ox Yoke Inn[®] menu, along with the story of its inspiration, Dakota Schorg.

"Some customers say they have to try it just for that reason," Leichsenring says. "Others just got hooked. We'll continue fundraising through those sales and build the scholarship."
